VA Educational Benefits are limited to a monthly stipend and/or payment of mandatory tuition and fees to the University. Benefits only pay stipends for the months for which school attendance is reported and these payments are pro-rated for partial (beginning and ending) months.

Chapter 31 and Chapter 33 benefits offer differing ways to providing funds for books and supplies. Chapter 33 will issue a book stipend prior to each terms while Chapter 31 provides all funding for books and supplies. Other benefits such as Chapters 30, 35, and 1606 provide no assistance with books and supplies.

Information regarding graduation rates and retention.

MGA tracks six-year graduation rates of all first-time full-time bachelor’s degree-seeking students as well as three-year graduation rates of all first-time full-time associates degree-seeking students. MGA also tracks the fall to fall retention of all first-time full-time students. As a member of the University System of Georgia (USG) in the state university sector, MGA uses USG definitions of graduation and retention and compares itself to its statewide peers. Information regarding the acceptance of transfer credits

Middle Georgia State University will accept transfer credits, however, not all transfer credits will apply to the degree program you choose.

The Joint service Transcript (JST) is the official transcript for Army, Marine Corps, Navy, and Coast Guard personnel. It validates and documents the American Council on Education (ACE) recommended college credits for professional military education, training courses, and occupational experience of service members and veterans. Some military students can receive MGSU transfer credit from their JST.

Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) transcripts show courses/training provided through the Air Force. Many courses from CCAF transfer to MGSU.

You may receive college transfer credit for credits earned through exams like the College Level Examination Program (CLEP) general and subject examinations, as well as the Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support (DANTES) Subject Standardized Tests (DSST exams).

Training, experience, examinations required for license certification or approval

Some programs, including but not limited to aviation, education, nursing, occupational therapy, and respiratory therapy, may require you to pass exams or other certification requirements before you can be certified to work in the field.
