Shadow, volunteer, and pursue research and internship opportunities that will augment your academic experience.

Talk with Career Development and your faculty to gather ideas. Use Handshake to identify potential internships.

Talk to your faculty early in the year to begin preparing for potential recommenders.

Prepare for and take required admissions tests. Many professional programs have a specific test. When they do not, the GRE is the most common. Check with each institution to be sure you are taking the correct test.

Register for any centralized graduation admission portals related to your field. This is common for professional health degrees and law. Many applications open in the summer before your senior year.

Finalize your list of institutions. Use professional associations associated with your field, Google searches, faculty, and career advisors to narrow down your list.

Update your resume or CV so that you can include it with your outreach to faculty about your recommendations. Brainstorm personal statements and prepare drafts.

Be sure to get feedback from Career Development on your resume. Don't use a template and stick to resources provided career development services at the university.

By summer, get ready to start your applications!

If you plan to enroll the fall after you graduation, applications are due as early as fall of senior year or as late as summer after graduation.

Get feedback from the CCLD, your faculty mentors, the Writing Center, and others when you write your personal statement.

Early applications may be considered for scholarships, assistantships, and be more likely to be admitted.

- Keep your GPA above a 3.0
- Talk with individuals who are in the field you want to pursue
- Get advice from faculty and career development advisors
- Build your experience with volunteer, shadowing, internships, research, and community and campus leadership
