

Commodore 64

The Commodore 64, also known as the C64 or the CBM 64, is a home computer produced by Commodore International in the early 1980s. It was one of the first computers to offer high-resolution graphics and sound capabilities and was a very popular home computer of its time, with sales of around 17 million units.

The C64 featured a MOS Technology 6510 microprocessor running at 1 MHz, 64 KB of RAM in its built-in keyboard, retailing for \$595. It also had an available cassette tape drive or floppy disk drive for data storage, and a monitor could be connected to it for display. It came with the Commodore BASIC programming language and it was known for its low cost, versatility, and its wide range of software options. It was widely used for gaming, programming, education, and home productivity.
