The BA in Contemporary Musicianship, which began enrolling students in fall of 2018, has had very healthy growth despite not meeting enrollment projections established in the USG program proposal. Between fall of 2018 and fall of 2020, the program grew 193%, reaching an enrollment of 44 students in fall of 2020. Like many other music programs in the University System of Georgia, The BA in Contemporary Musicianship faced enrollment challenges due to the pandemic. In fall of 2021, enrollment shifted slightly downward, with only 41 students registered in the program. With enrollment in high school music programs drastically down in the last two years, we anticipate enrolment growth will continue to be stalled or at least slower than prior years.

Although the BA in Contemporary Musicianship just began graduating students (4 in 2020 and 8 in 2021), success metrics indicate the program will be increasingly productive. Retention rates in the program are the best of all School of Arts & Letters programs—and arguably the best in the University. From fall 2021 to spring 2022 the BA in Contemporary Musicianship boasted a 96% retention rate.

Although the music program faces challenges in our post-pandemic world, indications are good that the program is of good quality and strong and viable. We will, of course, continue to carefully monitor productivity. Because the name of the program has caused confusion among students and may be impacting enrollment, we will consult with the Provost about the wisdom of changing the program's official name.

- The B.A. in Contemporary Musicianship (BACM) is designed to prepare the practicing musician for the 21st century cultural economy. Students will learn to capitalize on their artistic product through courses in marketing, entrepreneurship, and nonprofit management. They will learn to prepare a deliverable for various sectors of the industry through courses in music technology, studio production, song writing, scoring and arranging. The degree also provides ample space for electives, allowing students to tailor the degree to their career goals. The BA in Contemporary Musicianship has two tracks: industry and performance. The industry track will help students as they prepare for work in the music business, ranging from songwriting to the arts nonprofit sector. The performance track includes a choice between two concentrations: classical and commercial. All students will study standard technique through classical repertoire for the first two years. The final two years, students can choose to remain in a classical concentration, or transition to a commercial concentration, where they apply their technical study to various genres ranging from country to R&B to gospel. Consequently, students will acquire an omnicultural musical language that will equip them to move between various cultural marketplaces, and serve a rapidly expanding entertainment sector in Georgia.
  - Align of program mission with department, school, and institutional mission:
    - Institutional Mission: "Middle Georgia State University educates and graduates inspired, lifelong learners whose scholarship and careers enhance the region through professional leadership, innovative partnerships, and community engagement."
    - School of Arts and Letters (SOAL): "Our mission is to provide broad access to arts and humanities education that promotes creativity, elevates culture, encourages the pursuit of happiness, and prepares intellectually agile citizens to serve our communities and the creative economy of Georgia."
    - Department of Media, Culture and the Arts (MCA): "to build on a solid foundation in the liberal arts to guide students toward their academic

goals and prepare them for a global, culturally diverse society. MCA coursework develops student expertise in the visual arts and music; in creative, digital, and professional writing; in culture, gender, and media studies; and in modern language."

- The BA in music graduates students who will, through the very nature of the degree, be engaged in our community. They will teach in our schools, provide music for our radios, work at our music venues and become integral parts of the music scene in Macon and throughout the state. The degree provides students the opportunity to
- Program age, tracks, concentrations, etc: All students enter the Contemporary Musicianship program through the music industry track. For the first three semesters, there are no curriculum differences between the performance track and the industry track. At the end of the third semester, students can gain admission to the performance track with a C or better in MUSC 2201, a B or better in MUSA 2111, and the recommendation of their applied instructor. Students seeking admission to the performance track must successfully complete MUSC 2201within the first two attempts. Students who have earned a scholarship via an audition may gain entry to the performance track upon admission to the University.
- Method(s) of delivery: The degree is delivered face to face on the Macon campus
- Changes since last review: The BA began in the fall of 2018. There is no previous CPR for this degree.
- Benchmarks of progress:
  - Graduates: The program has had an increasing number of graduates over the last few years. We expect this number to continue to grow.
  - Enrollment: Enrollment has been steadily growing with a slight dip for the fall of 2021. The Pandemic impacted the performing arts particularly hard, especially in music with high school engagement in bands and choirs taking a significant hit due to concerns about Covid affecting enrollment in these programs. As the pandemic continues, and perhaps becomes endemic, we will see growth in high school performing arts which will in turn have a positive effect on college enrollment.
    - Some good news with enrollment is that the students who at MGA are committed to the degree. Music saw at 96% retention rate from fall of 2021 to spring of 2022.
  - Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs): SLOs are regularly met and a curriculum committee meets yearly to devise student learning initiatives as needed.

#### Plans for action

- Continue to have strong advising and review curriculum as needed to help with retention and progression.
- Continue to make adjustments to the program as necessary to allow students to move towards graduation. For example, in the spring of 2021 the industry track was overhauled to put more emphasis on the courses and skills needed in that track and to place less emphasis on the skills needed for students in the performance track. We have already seen the positive impact these changes have had on our students.
- Shifting trends and market forces that may impact program demand. As noted above, the pandemic has had a major impact on the performing arts.
